Faith, Love and Resilience

The ties that bind the Heinrich family together are battle worn but unbreakable. Their story is one of unimaginable trials and unstoppable love; a tribute to the power of faith and the strength of the human spirit.

Every story has a watershed mark, and for Tawnya and Nick Heinrich, theirs was 2008. The joy surrounding the birth of their son, Brody, was tempered by health complications beginning when Brody was just three days old. Recurring infections and headaches over the next few years led to a series of doctor's appointments, where the Heinrichs' concerns were met with skepticism. Two-year-olds, they were told, don't get headaches. "My mother's intuition knew something wasn't right," says Tawnya. "I kept fighting for my son."

In the midst of this nightmarish journey – the late-night ER visits, the endless tests – Tawnya was dealt a devastating blow. A chance exam led to a diagnosis of her own cancer, renal cell carcinoma. As one battle continued, another began.

Tawnya, an EMT, and Nick, a technical sergeant in the U.S. Air Force, continued their relentless search for the cause of Brody's pain. Their perseverance led them to Rady Children's Hospital San Diego, where they begged neurosurgeons to perform a CT scan of Brody's brain. Then came the news no parent wants to get: Brody had a severe case

of craniosynostosis, requiring emergency surgery. "That was the day the earth crumbled under our feet," says Tawnya. Just after his third birthday, Brody underwent the first of three major surgeries to reconstruct his skull in a series of 17 surgeries to combat various medical conditions. Two days later, Brody began having seizures and was sent to the pediatric ICU. A week later, he was able to return home – but the seizures and headaches persisted.

"Being in the trenches together has blessed us with a remarkable bond. Every challenge brought us closer as a family; I don't think there's anything we can't face now. We are grateful to everyone who helped bring us to this place with special thanks to Dr. Zach Woessner, Dr. Jesse Skoch, Dr. Brian Pan and Dr. Caitlin Hammond."

Two years later, after a move from California to Ohio for Nick's military service, Brody's headaches began to increase in severity and frequency. Testing at Cincinnati Children's Hospital revealed that his skull had closed back up, putting pressure on his brain as he grew. In January 2017, Brody endured an eight-hour cranio vault remodeling surgery. Soon after, the headaches returned – excruciating this time. An endless stream of doctor's visits and hospital stays resulted in a diagnosis of severe Ehlers Danlos syndrome, adding new therapies to Brody's growing list of treatments.

Through it all, Brody's radiant smile, infectious laugh and sweet, caring disposition melted the hearts of everyone he encountered. "He is the most fearless, loving and thoughtful person I know," says Tawnya. "He kept all of us going."

Brody was determined not to miss out on childhood. In between blood draws and surgeries, he pored through Harry Potter and Goosebumps books. Nestled in his hospital bed attached to feeding tubes and heart monitors, he drew, built LEGO's and watched his favorite shows: The Fast and the Furious, Cars and WWE NXT. And whenever he was able, Brody loved to play soccer and go fishing.

"I've had the pleasure of getting to know Brody over the last six years and marvel at how capable he is of facing adversity and bouncing back after repeated medical setbacks," says Dr. Zach Woessner at Dayton Children's Hospital. "His ability to adjust to all of the things thrown at him while remaining positive, strong and resilient at such a young age is magnificent and inspiring. His zest for life and gregarious personality are also impressive. I feel privileged to have been able to learn, share, and be a small part of Brody's life. He is truly magical."

Just as things seemed to improve, Tawnya's cancer returned. Nine years old now, Brody understood what he hadn't during Tawnya's first bout with cancer. "It's my turn to take care of mom," he told Nick. And that's what he did, doing all of the things in the hospital for Tawnya after her surgery that she had done for him so many times before.




In October 2018, with Tawnya's cancer in remission, Nick – now a military contractor after 21 years in the Air Force – deployed to Iraq for a fourth time. Two months later, Brody's health took a turn for the worse; and this time, Tawnya and Brody were in it alone. Recurring seizures and trips to the ER led Tawnya and Brody to Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, where tests indicated that his intracranial pressure was in the fatal range. More battle plans were drawn: another surgery would be needed. Doctors drained fluid from his brain to temporarily decrease the pressure as he waited.

In December 2019, the Heinrichs learned that Brody's wish to visit Give Kids The World had been granted. Two days later, on Brody's 11th birthday, he endured his most complex surgery yet – as well as the most painful recovery. "Knowing he would be going to Give Kids The World gave him something to look forward to...a reason to push through recovery," says Tawnya. At last, the seizures and headaches stopped.

In early March 2020, Brody and his parents arrived at the Village. "This was an adventure of a lifetime for all of us," says Nick. "Brody was overjoyed, he was able to be a kid with no worries in the world – something he fought so hard for. Brody will never forget the unlimited ice cream; the rides; the caring staff and volunteers; and the chance to meet his favorite wrestler, Tommaso Ciampa, at a WWE NXT event. The Village is truly a magical place for these children who fight big battles."

Brody's medical battles continue. Recently diagnosed with a rare autoimmune disease, Brody is recovering from surgery to remove a tumor in his foot. "He continues to inspire us every day with his tenacity and optimism," says Tawnya, who recently graduated from nursing school with the goal of becoming a pediatric critical care nurse.



A Story of Serendipity

It was serendipity that brought SNA Displays Executive Vice President Jason Helton to...Serendipity – Give Kids The World's brand new themed pirate ship stage, recently unveiled at the Village's Park of Dreams pool. The happy coincidence began as the Village was researching state-of-the-art LED screens for the ship, and happened upon the SNA Displays website. Jason was intrigued to see that the Village had browsed the site, and reached out to the organization that held such a special place in his heart. Twice before, it turns out, Jason had been to this magical place.

In 1992 at the age of 14, Jason was excited to become a big brother with the birth of his first sibling, Jessica. Jason eagerly took on many of the responsibilities helping to raise Jessica. The family's bliss was broken nine months later when Jessica was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer in her brain stem and spinal cord. "Hearing there was a 97% mortality rate for that type of cancer slammed us like an earth-shattering force," says Jason. "It's difficult to describe the intensity of emotion when first hearing this news."

The diagnosis led to three critical brain surgeries, followed by several years of chemotherapy. "The work of her neurosurgeon, Dr. Frederick Sklar, and her neurooncologist, Dr. Arlynn Mulne, was nothing short of miraculous," says Jason. Still, the experience took its toll. "As a big brother watching my younger sister fighting pediatric cancer, there is a feeling of desperation and a complete lack of control over the situation," he says. So it was extra special when the whole family was gifted with a trip to Give Kids The World. "The fact that I was included in this amazing experience meant the world to me," says Jason.

In 1995, Jason and his family spent a memorable week at the Village, where Jessica celebrated her third birthday. "Give Kids The World brought us hope, a welcome escape, and a glimmer of happiness during what was otherwise a dark and hopeless time," says Jason. "I remember watching as Jessica signed her star and had it placed in the Castle of Miracles; hers was one of the first stars to be placed there. The rides, the unlimited ice cream... the entire experience was very special." Against the odds, Jessica won her battle. She is now 28 and has been cancer-free for 25 years.

In 2010, Jason's previous childcare experience came in handy when he became a father for the first time with the birth of his daughter, Avelyn. Two years later, his son, Preston was born. In 2016 while on a Disney cruise, Jason and his wife discovered a lump on Preston's neck which they believed to be an insect bite. After several visits to infectious disease specialists and treatments with antibiotics to no avail, the Heltons visited an ear, nose and throat doctor, who ordered a biopsy. "It was difficult to see my son in scrubs in a children's hospital about to undergo surgery; it brought back a lot of hard memories from my sister's cancer," says Jason.

What came next was even more difficult; Preston was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia and was hospitalized immediately. He spent his fourth birthday undergoing heavy chemotherapy treatment and fought diligently through the next three and a half years.

In 2019, Jason returned to Give Kids the World Village, this time not as an older brother of a childhood warrior but as a father of one. "The staff was absolutely amazing and the volunteers are always exceptional. Preston loved the idea of staying in a community with other children who were battling cancer," he said.

Jason describes the wonderful but surreal experience of being back at the Village for a second time: "Preston had the most amazing week of his life. Give Kids the World provides not only an amazing trip for the wish child, but a much-needed escape for the entire family. Preston loves to play and imagine by battling enemies and we fought the Imperial forces, dark wizards, and a wide array of other characters that week.

"Preston and all of us have memories for a lifetime. Preston loved that he could eat all of the ice cream he could eat and went back for fourths on pizza. He was off the heavy doses of chemo by then and regained his appetite. He was able to ride the same carousel my sister rode 24 years earlier. It was very impactful to watch him sign his star in the same Castle of Miracles where his aunt has her star, and to see her star on the ceiling from 1995. As a brother and parent of a loved one fighting pediatric cancer, it is incredibly powerful to see so many stars together in one place. Each star represents a child's battle with a serious illness and a family's struggles with the constant hurdles and unknown difficulties ahead."

In early May, Jason returned to the Village to help oversee the installation of the SNA Displays LED screen on Serendipity accompanied by his family, who enjoyed a Welcome Back Family visit. "It was extraordinary being back at the Village," says Jason. "This was my opportunity to give back to the Village by providing the highest quality technology possible, below cost, to support the Serendipity project. The Village has been an extraordinary



beacon of hope for my family, and it's an honor to be able to contribute something to the property."

Jason continued, "The kindest souls I have ever met are those who share a smile and retain hope even when they are feeling at their worst. Thank you to everyone at Give Kids the World for supporting my family twice and allowing me to help provide unforgettable experiences to wish families."
